## BRIEF REVIEW OF GUATEMALA'S PROBLEMS AND PRELIMINARY OUTLINE PLAN FOR COMMONWEALTH TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

- 1- Guatemala has an area of 42,354 square miles where some 3,800,000 people live (2/3 are pure indian blood).
- 2- Primarily agricultural country. Approximately 70 per cent of the population lives from the soil. About 86 per cent of exports consist of coffee and bananas.
- 3- The Government owns and/or controls about 50 per cent of the total land area and about 20 per cent of the cultivated area.
  - 4- There is a strong demand for agrarian reform.
  - 5- There is considerable mineral wealth but inefficiently exploited
- 6- Very few manufacturing industries. Engaged in processing agricultural products and handicraft.

The principal barriers to economic development in Guatemala can be summarized as follows:

- 1) Illiteracy
- 2) Low level of health conditions
- 3) Political unstability
- 4) Inefficiency of governments officials
- 5) Lack of developmental planning (statistics, plans)
- 6) Limited domestic investment capital
- 7) Negative government attitude toward foreign investment
- 8) Lack of venture spirit
- 9) Lack of skilled labor
- 10) Lack of transportation facilities

The main fields in which Puerto Rico could offer technical assistance in the light of the foregoing problems are the following:

- 1) Education (general, community, special educational programs to fit their specific situation)
  - 2) Health
  - 3) Planning and public administration
  - 4) Agricultural experimentation and production
  - 5) Hydroelectric development and irrigation
  - 6) Cooperativism

First contacts for a technical cooperation agreement between the Commonwealth and Guatemala could be made through a visit by Dr. Morales Carrión, as part of his proposed trip to different Latin American countries.

There would follow a mission to Guatemala of a number of top Commonwealth officials to look into the general Guatemalan problem and to draft the technical assistance agreement plane

Selected Guatemalan public opinion leader would be invited by the Commonwealth Government to visit Puerto Rico and observe conditions here.
